Registration

Registration for the meeting is now open. Payment can be done either by mailing a check along with the completed <u>registration form</u> to Mary Ann Schmidt, AESE Business Office Manager, or using the online payment feature (link provided on registration form). Please note, if paying online, you must still send a completed registration from to Mary Ann. Registrants will be sent an email about 1 week prior to the meeting, providing information about where to pick up delegate bags and other registration material. On Wednesday, September 26, delegate bags will likely be available for pickup outside the Chairman's Boardroom just inside the Third Street entrance to the conference center. On Thursday and Friday, on technical session days, the delegate bags will be available outside or just inside the technical session room (Olmsted).

General Information about Niagara Falls and the City of Niagara Falls, N.Y.

Niagara Falls, the cascade, is situated on the border between Canada and the United States, specifically between the province of Ontario and the state of New York. It is actually a collective name for three waterfalls, from largest to smallest, the Horseshoe Falls, American Falls and Bridal Veil Falls. Both the American Falls and Bridal Veil Falls lie on the U.S. side, while Horseshoe Falls lies almost entirely on the Canadian side. At a height ranging from 70 to 188 ft (21 to 57 m), Niagara Falls is not the tallest waterfall in the world, but it is the largest in North America in terms of width and sheer volume of water—6 million ft³/min (168,000 m³/min)—cascading over its crest line. It has been a prime tourist destination since the mid-19th century, with people coming from around the world to see just the falls, themselves. But there is so much more to explore on both the American and Canadian sides of the falls, from world class wineries, hiking trails (Niagara Glen, The Whirlpool, Devil's Hole and Discovery gorge trails), historical offerings (Old Fort Niagara, Old Fort Erie, Brock's Monument, Erie Canalway), quaint towns (Niagara-on-the-Lake, Lewiston), adventure activities (Niagara rapids jet boat tours, Maid of the Mist, Cave of the Winds, helicopter tours) to art and culture (Artpark, Shaw Festival, Castellani Art Museum), science museums (Niagara Power Vista and Aquarium of Niagara) and natural park settings (Niagara Falls State Park, Whirlpool State Park, Niagara Glen). Accessing the bottom of the Niagara Gorge is easy, either by hiking trails, Maid of the Mist, Cave of the Winds, or via the free elevator ride provided at the Schoellkopf Power Plant museum. So remember to bring your passports and plan to arrive early or stay a few extra days if you wish to take in all that the area has to offer!

The city of Niagara Falls, N.Y., is adjacent to the Niagara River and the falls, and lies across from the city of Niagara Falls, Ontario. Its population is estimated to be around 49,000 people and continues to be a prime tourist destination because of its close proximity to the falls. The city is home to Seneca Niagara Casino and Hotel and also to Niagara Falls State Park, the oldest state park in the U.S. (thanks to Frederick Law Olmsted and other early environmentalists), which itself has several attractions: Cave of the Winds, Maid of the Mist, Prospect Point and its Observation Tower, Niagara Discovery Center, Niagara Gorge hiking trails and the Aquarium of Niagara, all easily accessed by a convenient shuttle system. Niagara Falls State Park, with its bridges to Goat Island, Three Sisters Islands and Luna Island, provides unparalleled access to the Niagara upper rapids and all three of the falls. Niagara Falls, Ontario, is just minutes away, by walking or car, via Rainbow Bridge, an arch bridge, that spans across the international border.

Getting to Niagara Falls, N.Y.

The city of Niagara Falls, N.Y., is within the Buffalo—Niagara Falls metropolitan area and is approximately 20 miles (32 km) from downtown Buffalo. The city can be easily accessed by air, car and train. Information provided below has been obtained from various websites and is current as of time of writing. We cannot guarantee accuracy. Please follow links provided and do your own research to ensure you have the latest and most accurate information prior to making travel plans.

By Air:

Niagara Falls does have an international airport, but it is small and offers limited flight options. Buffalo Niagara International Airport, located 25 miles (30 minute drive) from the city of Niagara Falls, is likely your better choice if flying to the meeting. Once there, several agencies provide <u>car rental services</u>, or you can arrange to take a <u>shuttle</u>, <u>taxi</u> or <u>ride-sharing</u> service (Uber or Lyft) to the meeting hotel. Prices vary widely, with some offering pricing per person and/or per group of people (1-4) in a sedan or SUV. If travelling alone, Uber or Lyft might be the cheapest options, along with <u>Buffalo Super Shuttle</u> (which has teamed up with our meeting hotel to offer rides for \$30 per person one way) or the on-site <u>Airport Taxi Service shuttle</u> (\$24 per person one way), but <u>shop around</u> for pricing and times that best suit your needs.

By Uber or Lyft:

Buffalo Niagara International Airport is <u>ridesharing friendly</u>. If you have arranged to be picked up by either Uber or Lyft, exit terminal doors closest to carousel 1 in the baggage claim area and follow signs to the designated pick up spots in the hotel shuttle bus lane.

Alternatively, if you're travelling light, you could take <u>public transportation</u> to Niagara Falls from Buffalo Niagara Airport, for a total of about \$4.50, but it might take about 2 hours to get there depending on traffic.

By Car:

By car, if travelling from within the U.S., Niagara Falls is conveniently located just minutes from Interstate 190. If arriving from Canada, take the Queen Elizabeth Way to Highway 420, then to Rainbow Bridge. From Buffalo Niagara International Airport, it's a 30 minute drive, taking Highway 290 West to I-190 North.

By Amtrak:

For the train enthusiast, travelling to Niagara Falls by Amtrak has just gotten easier with the opening of the new <u>Niagara Falls International Train Station</u> and Intermodal Transportation Center in January of 2017. The station is located about 6 minutes by car from the meeting hotel. <u>Amtrak</u> offers connecting service from all over the northeastern US to Niagara Falls. From New York City the trip is especially memorable, zipping along the Hudson River all the way north to Albany. From Albany you change trains only once all the way to the city of Niagara Falls. That portion of the trip is very scenic as it traces the majority of the route of the New York State Erie Barge Canal.

Sheraton at the Falls—Meeting Hotel

The meeting hotel will be the **Sheraton at the Falls**, located on Third St., directly across the street from The Conference and Event Center Niagara Falls, where our technical sessions will be held. The hotel is centrally located: Niagara Falls State Park (Maid of the Mist, Cave of the Winds, Observation Tower, Goat Island and the American Falls, Aquarium of Niagara and the Discovery Center) and the Red Coach Inn, the venue for our opening reception, are just 2 to 3 blocks from the hotel; Rainbow Bridge, providing access to Canada, is a 10 minute walk away, and from there the Falls on the Canadian side (spectacular views), is just another 25 minute walk; and Seneca Niagara Casino is across the street.


On-site Restaurants and Amenities

The hotel has two restaurants on-site, Rainforest Café and TGI Fridays, as well as Starbucks and has a number of <u>amenities</u>, including The Hydrospa, The Reef Beach Club and Pool, a fitness room, business center and on-site parking. A tunnel leads from the hotel to Seneca Niagara Resort and Casino across the street.

Rooms and Rates

A block of rooms has been set aside for attendees of the meeting, at a rate of **US\$129.00 per night** (run of the house = Double Queen or King guestrooms, but check if other options are available at this rate) for single or double occupancy. The group rate will be available until **August 19, 2018**, so remember to book early. There is an additional fee of \$10 per person per night for triple or quadruple occupancy. For those





wishing to arrive early or stay a little later after the meeting, this rate will be honoured for 2 days before the official start and end of the meeting (Sept. 26-29), subject to availability. (A complimentary breakfast is

not included in this rate; however, please note that a complimentary continental breakfast will be provided, as part of our technical program, outside the meeting room (currently the Olmsted Room) in the Conference and Event Center Niagara Falls, from 7:30 to 9:00 a.m. each day of the technical sessions (Thursday and Friday). Saturday's breakfast before the field trip will be on your own (TGI Fridays, on the hotel premises, is one option).)

<u>Note:</u> the above rate does not include applicable state and local (occupancy) **taxes** (which together are currently 13%). Because this hotel is a destination location, the hotel charges a **Destination Marketing Fee**, which will be 5% per night. Additionally, there will be a US\$9.95 **Facility Fee** assessed to each guestroom per night. This fee, normally US\$19.95, has been discounted for attendees of the AESE meeting. This fee includes the following (subject to change):

Making Room Reservations

It will provide details of the total cost and a breakdown of the various fees once you enter in required information. Please note that the site cannot be configured to apply the Facility Fee discount we'll be given, but it will most definitely be applied at the front desk when you check in. Those using the online reservation method will automatically be given a Double Queen room.

For those preferring to speak to someone in person, you may also reserve by calling 1.866.961.3780; mention "Association of Earth Science Editors" to ensure you get the group rate and discounted facility fee.

Reserve early: We encourage everyone to book their rooms early to ensure we can accommodate everyone who wishes to attend the meeting (Niagara Falls is generating interest!). We have set aside a small block of rooms (based on past years' attendance statistics), but the hotel is able to offer more rooms beyond the block, at the AESE group rate, provided there is availability.

<u>Cancellation Policy:</u> Cancellations must be received at least 3 days (72 hours) prior to check-in (4pm) or one night's fee will be charged. Note: this cancellation policy is for groups and differs from the cancellation policy listed on the website for individual bookings.

Conference Center Information

The technical sessions, business luncheon and the awards dinner will be held in the <u>Conference and Event Center Niagara Falls</u>, 101 Old Falls Street, located directly across from the Sheraton at the Falls. This new, state-of-the-art facility was built by the State of New York in 2004, from 3 existing buildings on the site, after the former convention center was given to the Seneca Nation to become Seneca Niagara Casino. Our various functions during the meeting will be held in the following <u>rooms</u> at the conference center:

Parking

For those not staying at the Sheraton at the Falls, and who may require parking facilities during the day while attending the meeting, there is plenty of <u>parking</u> in the area. Most city parking lots and ramps are \$20 per day; street parking is \$3 per hour; and parking at Niagara Falls State Park is \$10 per day. Opening Reception

The opening reception will be held 6:30 to 9:30 pm on Wednesday, September 26, at the historic Red Coach Inn, on the second floor. Free parking can be found at the back of the hotel. The Inn overlooks Niagara's Upper Rapids, and is just 500 m (5 minute walk) from the brink of the American Falls—a perfect location for those wishing to see the American Falls before or after the reception. Cross over to Goat Island using the

pedestrian bridge (Goat Island Road, the bridge closest to the American Falls) just west of the Inn and take in all three falls (American, Bridal Veil and Horseshoe). Access to the falls is via Niagara Falls State Park. Admission is free and it is open 24/7.

The Red Coach Inn (circa 1923) is a Niagara Falls USA historic hotel and B&B, built in the English Tudor-style and modelled after the Bell Inn in Finedon, England. The inn is named after General LaFayette's—the American Revolution hero—famous red carriage, a painting of which is above the fireplace in the Grill Room.



Technical Program

The technical program will take place September 27 and 28 (Thursday and Friday) and will be held in the Olmsted Room of the conference center. Planning for the technical program is beginning to take shape. The deadline for the *Call for Abstracts* has been extended to August 31st. Awards Dinner

The annual Awards Dinner will take place after the technical sessions end, on Friday, September 28, from around 6:00 to 10:00 p.m., and will be held in the Castellani Room of the conference center.

Field Trip

The meeting's field trip will take place on Saturday, September 29. We are delighted to announce that Dr. Carlton Brett, distinguished and award-winning paleontologist and geologist (University of Cincinnati), will be our field trip leader that day. Carl is no stranger to the Niagara area and its stratigraphy, having worked in the area and along the Niagara Escarpment for many years. He is in great demand as a field trip leader and we are thrilled he will be sharing his expertise with us that day.

The field trip will focus on the stratigraphy, sedimentology and paleontology of the Niagara area, with stops planned in Lockport (where we'll also stop to see the <u>locks</u>, part of the Erie Canalway System, a National Historic Landmark), Lewiston (mouth of the Niagara Gorge), Robert Moses Power Plant (access road down the gorge), and finishing the trip at Goat Island (to see the falls). Please join us for what promises to be a memorable day.

For those arranging flights to and from the meeting, please note that this will be a full-day field trip, leaving around 9:00 a.m. and returning approximately 6:30 or 7:00 p.m. in the evening.

Meals

Your meeting registration covers meals provided at the Opening Reception, Business Lunch and Awards Dinner, as well as lunch provided on the field trip on Saturday, and continental breakfast at the beginning of each day of technical sessions. If you have allergies, dietary restrictions or have special dietary needs, please be sure to indicate this on the registration form. You may also contact Marg to provide additional information.
